HISTORY OF LANCASTER

Pioneer Ebenezer Zane opened the first "road" through this part of Ohio in the year 1797. He cut down underbrush and blazed trees along the 266 mile "trace" so that it could be followed on horse from Wheeling, West Virginia, to Maysville, Kentucky.

Congress gave Zane three military tracts in payment. He was allowed to choose any land along "Zane's Trace." One of the sites he selected was on the Hock-Hocking River, marked by a huge rock formation called Standing Stone by the Indians. That site is now Lancaster—and Standing Stone is known as Mount Pleasant.

In 1799 a log grist-mill was built at the falls of Hock-Hocking, about six miles northeast of Lancaster. An ancient mill, known as Rock Mill, still stands at this site. That same year, a mail route was established over "Zane's Trace". Mail was carried on horseback. The route was ridden one way each week, with the first post office at Lancaster.

To the north of Standing Stone lay wonderful country for farms. The south held beautiful hills and wonderful rock formations. It was a country certain to attract settlers. So Ebenezer Zane's sons, Noah and John, laid out the village. A sale of lots was held on November 10, 1800, and the building of log huts began immediately. Zane donated the ground which is now the City square, and the new village was named New Lancaster, in honor of pioneers from Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

More settlers swelled New Lancaster's population. In 1805, by act of legislature, the name was shortened to Lancaster, and in 1831 it was incorporated.
